Pupil Premium information – to July 2016

The Government believes that the Pupil Premium, which is additional to main school funding, is the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meal and their peers by ensuring funding reaches the pupils who need it most to tackle disadvantage. The school receives this premium for any child who has been eligible for FSM at any time during the past six years. The money is targeted to close the attainment gap between children from low-income and other disadvantaged families and their peers.

It is for schools to decide how this Pupil Premium, allocated to schools per disadvantaged pupils is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility. The impact of this money is reported to Governors and other external agencies who hold schools to account. The progress of disadvantaged pupils is discussed termly with staff.

In the academic year 2014- 2014 Norfolk County Council allocated Alington & Bergh Apton Primary School £16 900 pupil premium grant.

The 2015/16 grant is £11 700

The 2016/17 grant is £11880 which we anticipate will be adjusted in autumn 2016 to £14 520

Use of grant

Additional teacher time

- Providing additional small group tuition with a teacher, both during school day and as an after school club
- Providing additional small group tuition for the more able with a teacher, both during school day and as an after school club

Teacher Assistant

- Specific targeted support for small group tuition for reading, writing and maths and early years intervention
- Additional phonics and spelling sessions
- Additional teacher assistant hours in the relevant classes
- Speaking and Listening activities such as Talk Boost
- Teacher assistant led interventions such as Numicon and Sounds Discovery
- Nurture groups in blocks of time as required incl additional lunchtime support

Equipment to support learning

- Dedicated laptop when appropriate

- Literacy games and maths equipment such as Numicon to support learning and homework
- Free school sweatshirt and shirt and PE uniform
- Investing in additional reading and spelling resources including Code X materials

Enhancing education

- Subsidised places on residential trips as well as free cost of day trips
- Places and transport paid for Cluster PE competitions
- KS2 whole class instrumental teaching
- Continued offer of a subsidised Breakfast Club five mornings per week

Widening experience

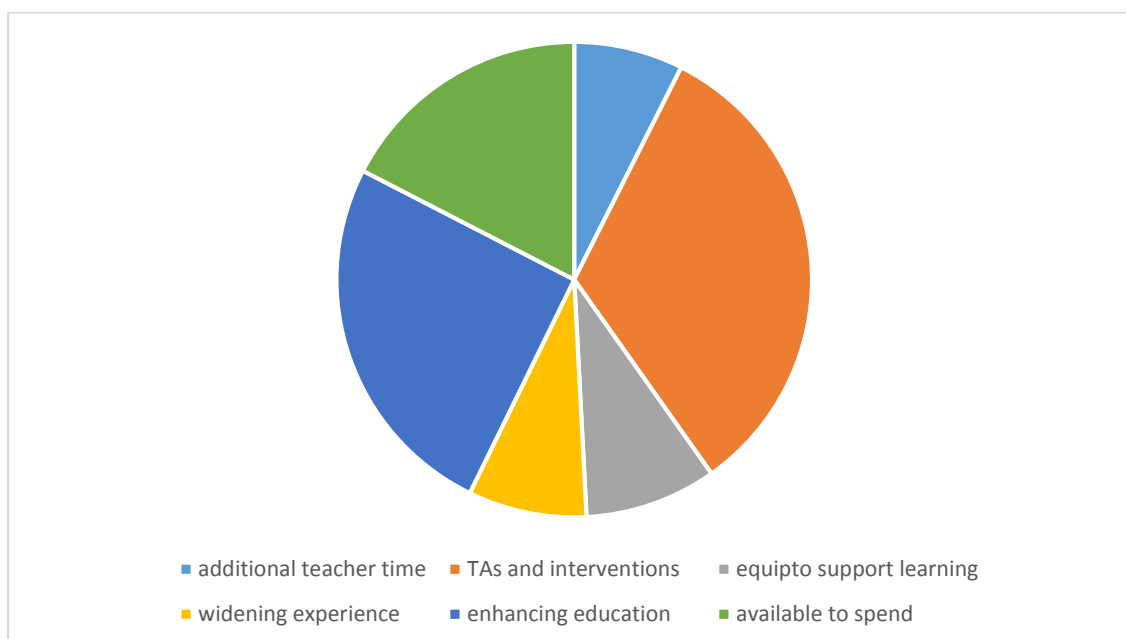
- Day visits from people of different faith and community backgrounds to broaden children's experience of the wider British cultural and religious family.
- Arts participation - Subsidised and free cultural activities such as theatre trips and music events
- Theatre trips –to plays both locally and in London
- Free attendance at weekly art, sports and gym clubs
- Free 1:1 music tuition

Impact:

Our latest end of year results – Summer 2016 show that in both end of KS1 and end of KS2 assessments and tests, all disadvantaged pupils made at least expected progress.
