### **Policy for Pupil Premium**

The Pupil Premium is allocated to schools with pupils on roll that are known to have been eligible for free school meals (FSM) at any time in the last six years; this is known as Ever6. Currently each of these pupils attract £1320. Schools have the freedom to spend the Premium, which is additional to the underlying schools budget, in a way they think will best support the raising of attainment for the most vulnerable pupils. The targeted and strategic use of pupil premium will support us in achieving our vision of commitment to excellence for all pupils.

We aim for all our children to:

- Lead safe, happy and fulfilling lives in a spirit of loving responsibility to others.
- Be creative, imaginative and resourceful learners who can develop their own interests and full potential.
- To develop a positive self-esteem and become well-balanced and independent individuals.

### **Principles**

We ensure that teaching and learning opportunities meet the needs of all of the pupils.

We ensure that appropriate provision is made for pupils who belong to vulnerable groups, this includes ensuring that the needs of socially disadvantaged pupils are adequately assessed and addressed.

In making provision for socially disadvantaged pupils, we recognise that not all pupils who receive free school meals will be socially disadvantaged.

We also recognise that not all pupils who are socially disadvantaged are registered or qualify for free school meals.

We reserve the right to allocate the Pupil Premium funding to support any pupil or groups of pupils the school has legitimately identified as being socially disadvantaged.

Pupil premium funding will be allocated following a needs analysis which will identify priority classes, groups or individuals. Limited funding and resources means that not all children receiving free school meals will be in receipt of pupil premium interventions at one time.

### **Provision**

The range of provision the Governors consider making for this group could include:

Providing small group work with an experienced teacher focussed on overcoming gaps in learning.

1:1 support.

Additional teaching and learning opportunities provided by trained TAs or external agencies.

All our work through the pupil premium will be aimed at accelerating progress moving children to at least age related expectations. Initially this will be in communication, English and maths.

Pupil premium resources may also be used to target able children on Free School Meals to achieve Levels 3 or 5 or 6.

Opportunities for children to take part in social or cultural activities, including trips and visits.

### **Reporting**

It will be the responsibility of the Headteacher, or a delegated member of staff, to produce regular reports for the Governing Body which should include:

- the progress made towards narrowing the gap, by year group, of socially disadvantaged pupils
- an outline of the provision that was made since the last meeting

The Governors of the school will ensure that there is an annual statement to parents on how the Pupil Premium funding has been used to address the issue of 'narrowing the gap', for socially disadvantaged pupils. This task will be carried out within the requirements published by the Department for Education (TBC) and will appear on our school website
